PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The importance of attending town halls and forums was brought home to me recently after attending many in the past few weeks.

I attended Supervisor Nate Miley's Town Hall on Repair California which featured Jim Wunderman from the Bay Area Council supporting a California Constitutional Convention, and Fred Keely, from CAForward supporting putting constitutional amendments on the ballot to address our state's inability to "take care of business."

I also attended a forum on the same topic, different speakers, put on by our sister League in the Fremont area.

After listening to the speakers and reading all the handout information, I changed my mind about which method for reforming state governance was the most effective.

I hope you will attend our League's forum on the topic on November 6, so that you can be an informed decision maker and voter as both these methods for reform will be on your ballot in 2010.

I also went to a forum on Abolishing the Death Penalty sponsored by the ACLU and supported by the State League. Hearing the presentation by a former attorney from the District Attorney's office, a former police chief from Newark, a union leader and pastor, and an attorney from the ACLU, was really informative and impressive.

I recently attended an Alameda County public Health Symposium which focused on "place counts" when assessing why certain segments of the population have shorter life spans and more chronic diseases. They showed on maps the "hot spots" in Oakland and Hayward that have the worst health outcomes. It was an eye opener.

The point of all reporting is to say that attending town halls and educational forums are important. It provides you with

the information you need to make decisions, allows time for you to ask questions, and energizes you to take action.

While my learner has a high school diploma, he needs to improve his skills in comprehension and writing. The office provides endless resources and an answer to any problem a tutor might encounter.

STATE AUDITOR RELEASES PROPOSED CITIZENS REDISTRICTING COMMISSION APPLICATION FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

Process Moving Forward to Create Historic New Commission

SACRAMENTO, CA -- Elaine M. Howle, California's State Auditor, released for public comment the application that will

allow Californians to apply for membership on the Citizens Redistricting Commission. The Commission will draw the state legislative and Board of Equalization lines.

"This is just the next step in this new process," said Howle, the official charged with the implementation of the selection and application process as identified in the Voters First Act.

"Earlier, we released proposed regulations for comment. We have now posted the application itself for public comment. After reviewing comments we receive, we will be able to finalize the regulations and the application and move forward.

All of this is aimed at providing the public the opportunity to provide input to the process and peaking the interest of the largest audience possible to secure thousands of applications from a pool of applicants that reflects California's diversity."

Proposition 11, the Voters First Act, changed the process by which the State Senate, Assembly, and Board of Equalization districts are drawn, transferring the responsibility to draw the lines from the Legislature to a new 14-member commission made up of citizens from throughout California.

The State Auditor is charged with establishing a process for individuals to apply to become members of the Commission and with selecting a panel to assess the applicants and select 60 of the most qualified applicants. The 14 commissioners, made up of five democrats, five republicans, and four from neither party, will then be selected from that pool.

Applications will be available on the Web site from mid-December 2009 through mid-February 2010.

Local Revenues for Schools: Limits and Options in California

Has the turbulence of the state budget got you wondering whether there is a better way to fund schools and districts? This new EdSource report sheds light on that question.

As the single largest expenditure in California's budget, K-12 education funding (and consequently the very ability of school districts and schools to operate) has been mired in the chaos that has characterized California's budget process in recent years.

School districts have endured deep cuts in state funding with little recourse, since California law severely limits their revenue-raising authority, leaving the K-12 education system vulnerable to economic volatility and Sacramento politics.

More than state and local efforts will be needed to repair, replace, or rebuild California's water infrastructure. The current system for water storage and water delivery was developed when the population of California was 25 million residents; it is now at 38 million and counting. Message From the Director U.S. Census Bureau—Steve H. Murdock

Every decade since 1790, the U.S. Census Bureau has conducted a constitutionally mandated census to determine the number of people living within the United States and our territories. These data are used by our nation's leaders to help make vital decisions on behalf of all residents, including reapportionment and redistricting. Census data also affect how more than \$300 billion in federal funds are distributed to tribal, state, and local governments each year.

One of the primary goals of the 2010 Census is to increase the national mailback response rate. This not only reduces the overall cost of the census, but it also increases the accuracy of these data as well. Tribal, state, and local governments, as well as community and business organizations can help us achieve this goal by bringing local knowledge and expertise to the process.

The Complete Count Committee is a major vehicle for planning and implementing local, targeted efforts that will uniquely address the special characteristics of your community. The role of the Complete Count Committee will be to plan and implement local outreach efforts to publicize the importance of the 2010 Census. The work of this committee will be innovative, exciting, and rewarding.

The *2010 Census Complete Count Committee Guide* provides guidelines for the active involvement of government officials, community leaders, and businesses in promoting the 2010 Census to residents in your area. The guide suggests a structure for organizing a local campaign, provides examples of activities that may be implemented, and gives a timetable for these activities. If you have any questions about the guide or how to get started forming your own Complete Count Committee, please refer to the back of this guide for your local Census Bureau Regional Office or visit www.census.gov/2010Census.

Your participation in the 2010 Census program is voluntary. However, many government officials and community leaders understand that their participation is vital to help ensure an accurate and complete count of their community. The Census Bureau is strongly committed to the most accurate and efficient census in 2010. With your help, we will ensure every resident is counted once—only once—and in the right place. We look forward to partnering with you to obtain an accurate count for your community.

Why do we take the Census?

- The U.S. Constitution (Article I, Section 2) mandates a headcount every 10 years, of everyone residing in the United States: in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and the Island Areas. This includes people of all ages, races, ethnic groups, citizens, and noncitizens. The first census was conducted in 1790 and has been carried out every 10 years since then.
- The next census occurs in 2010. The population totals from this census will determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. States also use the totals to redraw their legislative districts.
- The U.S. Census Bureau must submit state population totals to the President of the United States by December 31, 2010.
- The totals also affect funding in your community, and data collected in the census help inform decision makers how your community is changing. Approximately \$300 billion in federal funding is distributed to communities each year.

Will the 2010 Census be the same as 2000?

- No, there are some important changes:
- 2010 Census will be short form only—just 10 easy questions.
 - The long form is now part of the annual American Community Survey.
 - Handheld computers with Global Positioning System will be used to check our address list in 2009.
